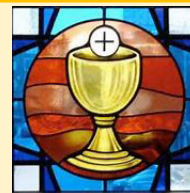

GOSPEL: JOHN 6:51-58

Jesus said to the Jewish crowds: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." The Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink.

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live forever."

NICENE CREED

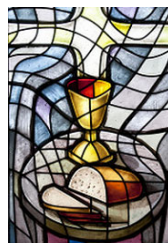


This SAT, JUN 20, is the Feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Our Lady of Fatima is said to have asked for the consecration of the

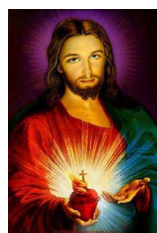
world to Her Immaculate Heart. To it, must be added devout prayers, a true repentance and penance for the sins of men. In 1942, Pope Pius XII consecrated the world to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Today in the Church we celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This feast



is also known by its Latin name, "Corpus Christi". To recall the institution of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday, when sorrow over the Passion, the prime thought during Holy Week, hinders a proper celebration, this feast was established and is celebrated on the Thursday (or Sunday) after Trinity Sunday. It owes its origin to the progressive development of worship and devotion to the Blessed Eucharist during the Middle Ages, and to a revelation to St. Juliana of Liege where it was first celebrated as a local feast. In 1264 it was extended to the Universal Church.



This FRI, JUN 19, is the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. This feast is a reminder of all that we owe to the love of our Divine

Redeemer. It is an appeal to our gratitude and it should prompt us to offer to the Divine Heart satisfaction and reparation for the numerous offenses of which we and others have been guilty. Appearing to St. Margaret Mary Alacogue during the Octave of Corpus Christi in the year 1675, Jesus said to her, "This is the heart which has loved men so much and in turn is so little loved by them."



Prayer to the Sacred Heart

It seems strange to be addressing a special prayer to Thee, O Sacred Heart, since it is to Thee that all my prayers are eventually directed. But perhaps the present prayer is not so much a supplication as a statement. I want to explain that my intention is from now onwards to imitate Thy Sacred Heart, not merely to ask its favors. In answer to Thy Gospel invitation I come to *learn* of Thee, not merely look at Thee; to take Thy lead, not merely talk about Thy love. Lord, I purpose to myself the self-sacrifice, the meekness, the accessibility, the hospitality, the generosity toward the Father and my fellow Christians, which is exemplified for us in the ever-open Heart of Jesus. Amen.

Today, SUN, JUN 14. is the holiday known as Flag Day. When the American Revolution broke out in 1775, the colonists weren't fighting united under a single flag. Instead, most regiments participating in the war for independence against the British fought under their own flags. In June of 1775, the Second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia to create the Continental Army - a unified colonial fighting force - with the hopes of more organized battle against its oppressors. This led to the creation of what was essentially, the first "American" flag, the Continental Colors.

For some, this flag, which was comprised of 13 red and white alternating stripes and a Union Jack in the corner, was too similar to that of the British. George Washington soon realized that flying a flag that was even remotely close to the British flag was not a great confidence-builder for the revolutionary effort, so he turned his attention towards creating a new symbol of freedom for the soon-to-be fledgling nation.

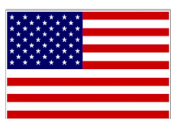


On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress took a break from writing the Articles of Confederation, and passed a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white", and that "the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."



In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson marked the anniversary of that decree by officially establishing June 14 as Flag Day.

In the 1950's when it seemed certain that Alaska would be admitted to the Union, designers began retooling the American flag to add a 49th star to the existing 48. Meanwhile, a 17 year-old Ohioan named Bob Heft, borrowed his mother's sewing machine, disassembled his family's 48-star flag and stitched on 50 stars in a proportional pattern. He handed in his creation to his history teacher for a class project, explaining that he expected Hawaii would soon achieve statehood as well. Heft also sent the flag to his congressman, who presented it to President Eisenhower after both new states joined the Union. Eisenhower selected Heft's design, and on July 4, 1960, the president and the high school student stood together as the 50-star flag was raised for the first time. Heft's teacher promptly changed his grade from a B- to an A.



SUMMER SOLSTICE IS SUN, JUN 21. On this day the sun is at its highest in the northern hemisphere. It is the official beginning of summer, and an ancient day of celebration. In places north of the Arctic Circle, called "the land of the midnight sun", the sun never sets during the days near the summer solstice. In most of northern Europe, although the sun does set for awhile each day, these are called "the days that never end" because dawn begins before the evening twilight has faded. The sky is never completely dark.



Many ancient peoples made today one of the great feasts. People lit huge bonfires during these shortest nights of the year to announce the official change of seasons. Some sort of protection at this time of year seemed especially important because spirits were thought to wander about during festival times.

As European nations became Christian, the solstice traditions became associated with the birth of St. John the Baptist (JUN 24), called Mid-Summer Day, because it is midway between the vernal and autumnal equinoxes.

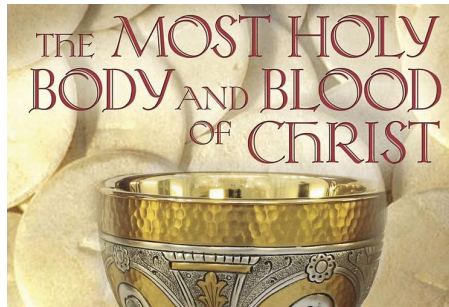

REAL COMMUNION

"The Body of Christ" refers to the church as well as to the Eucharist. When we share in the Body and Blood of Christ, we have communion with God and with one another.

Jesus is present to us in many ways. We hear his voice in the Gospel. We experience his love in our community. We receive him sacramentally in the Eucharist. We are called the Body of Christ because Christ dwells with us.

St. Paul wrote the Corinthians, "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf."

Hello, I'm your envelope reminder angel. I've been assigned to watch over you for the summer months. While you're enjoying summer fun and sun, don't forget your church here at home. When we receive Communion we experience our communion with one another. Many though we are, we are one in Christ. Just as many grains of wheat make one loaf, just as one loaf is shared by many people, just as many people become one by sharing that one loaf, so do the many become one in Christ. Jesus unites our community when we share our communion together.

Paul's words were especially significant to the Corinthians. He began this letter addressing the divisions in their church and calling the faithful there to unity. At this point in his letter, we understand why. Their unity in the church is critical to the integrity of their worship.

If our Eucharist is to be sincere, our communion must be real. We eat the Body of Christ. We drink the Blood of Christ. We are the Body of Christ.
