ANOINTED WITH THE SPIRIT

Once in a while, God gives us a sign of hope. The clouds of winter yield to the sun of spring. A new friendship develops. An infant brings new joy to a family. Although the season of Lent has urged us to think about sin, it does so against a background of hope. We do not hear the story of sin without hearing also the story of salvation.

When Samuel visited Jesse to anoint a king from among his sons, Israel received a sign of hope. God chose not the eldest son of lofty stature but the youngest son who was busy tending sheep. Samuel anointed him with a horn

of oil and God's Spirit rushed upon the young man. We learn his name only at the end of today's reading: David.

David, overlooked by those who should have seen with God's eyes, became a symbol of Jesus. The legendary kingship of David foreshadowed the blessed kingship of Jesus. Jesus is the one we call "Christ," a title that means "anointed."

On your journey through Lent, you have entered a period of renewal. Are you beginning to see God at work within you this season? Can you see the Spirit of God in others where you have not noticed it before?

AS CONCERNS SURROUNDING THE SPREAD OF THE CORONAVIRUS CONTINUE TO GROW, BISHOP EDWARD C. MALESIC, AFTER CONSULTING WITH THE PRESBYTERIAL COUNCIL AND SENIOR STAFF. DECIDED TO TEMPORARILY SUSPEND ALL WEEK-• FOR YOUR INFORMATION • DAY AND WEEKEND PUBLIC MASSES IN THE

DIOCESE OF GREENSBURG, EFFECTIVE WED, MAR 18, 2020.

Churches should, however, remain open for private prayer a few hours each day as local circumstances permit. In our parishes, St. Rita Church will be open for private prayers from I lam-Ipm daily ... that is 7 days a week

Bishop Malesic urges the faithful to remember in their prayers all those whose lives have been impacted by the coronavirus outbreak. "This is a seriously contagious illness. We have trust that God will see us through but we must do our part to not overwhelm our hospital systems. We have a responsibility to our neighbors. These actions help us to be proactive in the spread of the disease," the Bishop said.

Bishop Malesic is asking that priests continue to offer Mass daily in private for all published parish Mass intentions, as well as offer additional prayers at these Masses for the protection of our flock during this time of crisis. Priests will continue to respond to all pastoral emergencies and provide Anointing of the Sick and Viaticum for the critically ill and dying.

- All other gatherings including Faith Formation (e.g. RCIA) are now suspended, but should continue electronically if possible.
- Fish fries, bake sales and the public celebration of Stations of the Cross, Caplet of Divine Mercy, Morning/Evening Prayer and Rosary are all suspended.
- All public Penance services are suspended.
- Those who require the sacrament of reconciliation should contact their parish for an appointment.

Our parish bulletins will be available for distribution beginning on SAT mornings at each of our 4 churches. They will be in plastic containers at the front door of St. Al and St. Rita, and at the side door of IC and St. John. Please help yourself to a bulletin, and feel free to take bulletins to others if so desired. Please make sure the lid is replaced on the container securely in order to keep them in place for the whole week. New bulletins will be available every SAT morning for the upcoming week. This practice will continue until daily Mass resumes.

Please know that the offices at St. Rita and St. Aloysius will remain open for their regularly scheduled hours. I would ask that you handle as much parish business over the phone as you can. You are welcome at the office though for any important parish business or information. FR. Paul

"INNER STRENGTH - CENTEREDNESS". You have a divine spark within you. It will not show up in a photo or even in an x-ray. No amount of physical probing will reveal a soul that is tangible. But the real "YOU" is something special, whatever your race or nationality or even your chosen religion. You, yourself, are unique and valuable, not necessarily better or worse than someone else, but important and significant as part of the world's life.

It is important to build upon that inner quality we have. How much, and in what ways, can we make our fullest contribution to life? Being a person of value is both a joy and a responsibility. Our Creator God needs creative souls to make our world become what God wants it to be. Whatever your talents or position in life, you are part of God's plan and you and God make a great team.

Finding strength of soul and effectiveness in living requires a certain "centeredness". Who are you, really? What are you in your inmost self? Where does the divine spark reside in your being? Perhaps, you have been so busy fulfilling your various roles that you have not given this much thought. Could the Lenten Season be a time for rediscovering your inmost soul? If you can do this, some problems of life that weaken or hinder you may lose their power over you.

God's indwelling spirit can free us to rest and redirect our energies. We learn not necessarily to work harder but to work more effectively. The Sacrament of Holy Communion can reflect a daily, Holy Communion with God through thought and prayer. God is the wine, the blood of life that enlivens us. God is the bread, the substance of life that nourishes us.

God's spark of life within us can become a spiritual fire that warms and empowers us to fulfill our role in God's creation.

THIS WED, MAR 25, WE CELE-BRATE THE SOLEMNITY OF THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE LORD.

According to the first chapter of Luke's Gospel, the angel Gabriel came to tell Mary about God's plan of salvation.

The angel announced that Mary was chosen to be the mother of Jesus, the Son of God. Mary freely answered, "Here I am, the servant of the Lord." Despite her puzzlement over the angel's mysterious words, she trusted in God's goodness.

At Easter we take joy in the willingness of Jesus to be our Savior by his death and burial and rising. Today God begins the work by becoming flesh in Mary's womb. This mystery is expressed in the Angelus prayer, which some people recite at the beginning, middle and end of each day. Here are its final words:

LORD, FILL OUR HEARTS WITH YOUR GRACE; ONCE, THROUGH THE MESSAGE OF AN ANGEL, YOU REVEALED TO US THE INCARNATION OF YOUR SON; NOW, THROUGH HIS SUFFERING AND DEATH, LEAD US TO THE GLORY OF HIS RESURRECTION.

Artists often show Mary in a garden when Gabriel appeared to her. They want to remind us of the garden of Eden, where Adam and Eve said "no" to God. Here, today, in a new garden, Mary said "yes."

In ancient times, scholars worked out all feasts of the year mathematically. They decided that March 25 is a remarkable day. They calculated that this is the day Jesus died on the cross. Perhaps too, the Jews' exodus from Egypt and even the creation of the world began on this day. And if all those things occurred on this wonderful day, then surely this must be the best day to begin each new year.

For several hundred years, beginning in the 12th century, March 25 was the official New Year's Day in many Christian countries. This matches the practice of several other cultures and countries, such as Iran, which still begin the year at the vernal equinox.

The Annunciation of the Lord is celebrated with symbols of the Holy Spirit, such as wind and fire. Christians in Greece fly kites. Jamaicans have sailboat races. Scandinavian and French people make yeast-raised waffles and serve them with whipped cream. It is a day to search for signs of the newly arrived springtime.



Last weekend our Mass attendance was significantly lower than usual – and rightly so. Most people are taking very

seriously the precautions of avoiding public gatherings to prevent the spread of COVID-19. As a result, the Diocese of Greensburg dispensed the faithful from obligatory Mass attendance. In fact, by the time you are reading this, all public Masses in our diocese may have been cancelled, following suit with other dioceses around the world.

In the Vatican II document Sacrosanctum Concilium, we read the following: From the liturgy, therefore, and especially from the Eucharist, as from a font, grace is poured forth upon us; and the sanctification of men in Christ and the glorification of God, to which all other activities of the Church are directed as toward their end, is achieved in the most efficacious possible way. (SC 10)

So if we truly believe that the liturgy is profoundly important for the Church and if we truly believe that the Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life" (SC 47), how are we to lead our Christian lives without it? What are we to do when we are called to stay away from Mass?

A brief history lesson can be instructive. There have been times and places in history where a Catholic community has survived without priests. When Catholic missionaries first arrived in Japan in 1549, they were welcomed and their faith spread. But by 1639 they were either martyred or forced to leave or renounce their faith publicly. Over 200 years later,

Fr. Bernard-Thadee Petitjean arrived in Nagasaki, Japan to minister to foreigners and found a thriving underground Christian community – the *Kakure Kirishitan*, or "hidden Christians". Without the priesthood and without access to any sacraments other than baptism, the community survived and preserved and passed down the faith for generations.

Additionally, for much of the Church's history, frequent communion was uncommon – from about the 9th century until the early 20th century.

So although at times or in certain situations we may be unable to receive the Eucharist sacramentally, we can always receive the Eucharist spiritually.

Although theologians often spoke of the importance of frequent communion and the magisterium permitted receiving often, the popular spirituality of the faithful was that communion was so sacred that receiving it unworthily could lead to condemnation. Additionally, "ocular communion", or simply gazing upon the body and blood of Christ, was understood to be a real sort of communion (which led to the practice of elevating the host during the consecration and the practice of Eucharistic adoration).

The people in the Middle Ages and the Kakure Kirishitan were sustained by something called "spiritual communion". St. Thomas Aquinas explained that there are two ways to receive Christ – sacramentally and spiritually. Sacramental communion is the physical receiving of the Eucharist in the form of bread and/or wine. Spiritual communion is the proper disposition of a person who is spiritually united with Christ through faith and charity. "Perfect" receiving of the sacrament involves the unity of sacramental and spiritual

communion. "Imperfect" receiving of the sacrament involves just a spiritual communion. (This ought to challenge us when we receive the Eucharist weekly to always have the proper spiritual disposition and not to simply let it become thoughtless or rote!)

So although at times or in certain situations we may be unable to receive the Eucharist sacramentally, we can always receive the Eucharist spiritually. St. Teresa of Avila wrote in The Way of Perfection, Ch. 35, "When you do not receive communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you." Saints Frances de Sales and Maximilian Kolbe made frequent spiritual communions during their day. And St. Leonard of Port Maurice stated: "If you practice the holy exercise of spiritual Communion several times each day, within a month you will see your heart completely changed".

For those who cannot receive the Eucharist during these challenging days ahead, I would encourage a regular spiritual communion to remain connected with Christ and His Church.

There are many ways to make a spiritual communion. One simple way is to place yourself in the presence of God and pray a prayer like the following: My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. (brief pause to unite oneself with Jesus) I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You.
