FIRST READING: ACTS 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48

When Peter entered, Cornelius met him and, falling at his feet, paid him homage. Peter, however, raised him up, saying, "Get up. I myself am also a human being." Then Peter proceeded to speak and said, "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality.

Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him." While Peter was still speaking these things, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who were listening to the word. The circumcised believers who had accompanied Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit should have been poured out on the Gentiles also, for they could hear them speaking in tongues and glorifying God. Then Peter responded, "Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people, who have received the Holy Spirit even as we have?" He ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ.

THE CREED. Following the readings and the homily, we stand together and say or sing the Creed, our profession of faith. The Creed states our core beliefs about God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Creed that we pray most often, the Nicene Creed, originated in a time of great controversy about the divinity of Christ, and thus the longest section of the Creed relates to Christ, truly human and truly God. The Creed is both communal and personal: it is "we," but it is also "I." In the RCIA, it is only after listening to the Church's teaching on professing faith in the Holy Trinity that the candidate is admitted to the sacraments. So it is each Sunday. We listen to the word, we profess our faith, and then we come to the altar.

THU, MAY 13, IS THE FEAST DAY OF THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD.

The celebration of Easter is the oldest yearly festival of the Church. We know because we still have a few writings from 2nd century Christians, such as Bishop Polycarp of Smyrna. When he was young he was taught by some of Jesus' disciples.



On the night of the Jewish Passover Polycarp celebrated in memory of the death and resurrection of Christ. Other Christians celebrated on the SAT night and SUN that followed Passover. In those earliest years of the Church, once a year at Passover time, Christians celebrated the fullness of Jesus - His birth and baptism, His life and teachings, His death, burial and resurrection. They celebrated the glory of Christ and the sending of the Holy Spirit.

Especially in the 4th and 5th centuries, new holy days were kept in celebration of gospel events. That's when most Christians started to celebrate such days as Christmas, Epiphany, the Presentation, the Annunciation, and the birth of John the Baptist. This didn't happen everywhere at the same time. There were different ways of celebrating and different ways of calculating the seasons.

In the late 4th century many Christians began to celebrate a feast day in memory of the Ascension of the Lord. In most places this was kept on the 40th day of the 50 days of Easter rejoicing.

St. Paul wrote to the Church in Ephesus: "The fullness of Christ fills all in all." That is what we celebrate on Ascension Day. This day is not about the absence of Christ. It is about Christ's presence. At the end of Matthew's gospel Jesus says, "I am with you always".

How It All Began ... Mother's Day is one of the most celebrated of American holidays. Moms, grandmas, sisters, friends and those who are "just like a mother" are honored on this special day. The tradition can be traced back to 250 BC, but it was Anna Jarvis who began the tradition in the US. She came up with the idea of holding a special church service to honor motherhood, which was first held on MAY 10, 1908, in Philadelphia, on the anniversary of her own mother's death. Anna asked all who attended to wear a white carnation - her mother's favorite flower. Mother's Day quickly caught on, and by 1911 every state had its own observance. President Woodrow Wilson made the celebration official in 1914, stating that the 2nd SUN in MAY would always be called "Mother's Day". He declared that mothers were "the greatest source of the country's strength and inspiration".

I John 4:7-10
WHERE LOVE COMES FROM

Who can explain love?

One day you meet someone, and your heart is filled with a love you never knew was in there. Where does it come from? How did it get there? What prompted it to come out? Why does it feel this way?

Love warms us like nothing else. It inspires us to be good to others - and not just to the person we love. The love we have for one person is so great that it spills out in our actions and attitudes toward others. You become a more loving person to all because you became a loving person toward one.

Love comes from God. God is love. God loved us first before we loved

any other person, and before we loved God. John writes, “Love is of God; everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God.” When we love someone - whether or not we realize it - we are experiencing God. God loves first.

Some people have another experience of God. They imagine God as an angry, authoritarian figure. Or they go to church and find God - well, boring. John suggests the problem might not be with God. It might be with us. “Whoever is without love does not know God, for God is love.”

It takes time to get to know God. But if we take time, we will experience love. Then we’ll know where love comes from.


